

From Pastor Paul:

I would like to update you on the current status of pledging toward the 2024 financial needs of our church. As of today, we have received 64 pledges, totaling \$400,830. The goal is \$535,000, which means that, as of today, we have raised only 75% of our goal and need \$134,170 to reach it. Clearly, we've got a ways to go.

If you are among those who have pledged in the past but not yet pledged this year, I urge you to do so as soon as you can--and please consider raising your pledge from last year. If you have not been a pledger before now, would you please consider doing so now?

It's easy to think of this kind of appeal as trying to reach an institutional budget, but I invite you to see it differently. Our commitments to support the church financially are about what the church can *be* and *do* in the coming year. It's about our ministering to real human needs locally and elsewhere. It's about nurture and love for children, teens, and students, and education for adults as well. It's about our worship, our music, our preaching, and our caregiving. And since each year builds upon the last, it's about our *future*, about whether or not we grow, and how vital and thriving we will be.

Please give serious consideration to offering your pledge now for the church's life and ministry in 2024---and, if you've already done so, to raising it. It can make a bigger difference than you know.

Holiday Collection for the Hikone Community

For many years we have collected food and other supplies for our friends in the Hikone housing community which is one of the sites of Community Action Network. The December school vacation is very tough on low-income families because children are not in school to receive their breakfast and lunch so more food is needed at home. The families at Hikone have been so grateful because your donations help them take care of their children and possibly have enough to also buy gifts for the holidays.


We will spend the month of November (through December 3) collecting:

- **Kid-friendly foods**: cereal, oatmeal, canned pasta, mac-and-cheese, chili, peanut butter, soup, tuna, granola and protein bars, fruit cups, juice/milk boxes, etc.
- Food that isn't usually available in the food pantries: flour, baking soda and powder, spices, olive and vegetable oil, sugar, macaroni, rice.
- **Family Supplies** that can't be bought with food stamps: cleaning supplies, personal hygiene products (deodorant, toothpaste, shampoo, hand and shower soap)
- **Financial donations:** Your financial donations will be used for fresh produce, laundry detergent, toilet paper and paper towels, and gift cards which are distributed by the Community Director for emergency needs.
- **Gently used books for children and youth:** These are highly valued by the families to use a holiday gifts.

We sort and box everything at the church and then transport to Hikone. Your medium-sized Amazon boxes are needed! Bring your donations each Sunday, beginning November 5 through December 3. Please mail your financial donation to the church before December or place it in the offering plate with a

WE NEED 11 MORE HOSTS FOR THE ROTATING SHELTER

During the cold winter months, the emergency overnight shelter at Delonis is not sufficient for the need. Area congregations host a weekly rotating shelter to fill the gap so no one is sleeping outside in freezing temperatures. Our week for hosting begins on the evening of Monday, December 11 and goes through Sunday, December 17.

We have two main ministry tasks - provide hosts to be present throughout the evening and throughout the night and a few hot meals on the weekends. There are 3 volunteer opportunities each night: 1 evening only shift (6:30-10:00p) and 2 evening and overnight shifts (6:30p-7:30a and 8:30p-9:00a). The overnight volunteers will each take a hosting shift (4 hrs) and a sleeping shift in the Memorial Lounge (4 hrs). Are you interested in serving for the first time and want to be paired with someone who has done it before? Let us know and we will find you an experienced partner.


